manager of the Test Kitchen at Oscar Mayer for 20 years where she created the recipes that delighted families and defined an era. She was one of the first people in the country to figure out microwave directions for cooking up those quick meals that changed a generation. Is it any wonder that when she discovered an innovative program for seniors to help them stay in the homes they loved, she became a member of SAIL.

There are so many ways that SAIL sustains Betty's independence, all the while opening up her social world, and she has many stories to validate that claim. Her first call to SAIL was before she was even a member. She was rushing out to a meeting only to discover that her garage door would not open, trapping her car inside. One of her friends had told her that SAIL could solve any problem, so she called in that desperate moment. Without hesitation, SAIL sent a repairman over to open the garage and save the day.

But it was Member Lois Curtiss that got her to join after Betty's neighbor died and she lost the friend that checked on her regularly. The SAIL Rise and Shine daily check-in was the program that clinched the deal. Now she calls in every day, knowing that her missed call will trigger a response. (Continued on page 3)

Sladky is leading the final, public phase of Olbrich's Rooted and Growing capital campaign to build an education center and greenhouse. The city of Madison is slated to provide about half of the \$10 million from the 2018 capital budget. They jointly own/operate the gardens with the non-profit Olbrich Botanical Society.

When I call SAIL, I know that these people are safe to let into my home and will not take advantage of me. That is peace of mind!"

Members are not only friends; they often support one another with their talents and time. Betty embraces life with vigor and delight because she knows that SAIL is there to help her through whatever challenges she might face.

#### Men's Roundtable by Member Fred Ross


Join us on Tuesday, February 13 at 10:00 a.m. in the Heritage Oaks Social Room at Oakwood Village University Woods.
